Ned Readon, Abbey Fairbrother and myself had recently been certified as our Club's Mental Health First Aider with generous sponsorship from SLSA. There are so many pathways for each of us on and off the beach to build a vibrant Surf Life Saving Club that cares about our people, environment and our community.

Reporting from the back office has proved to be such a humbling experience. This club is a special one because of each one of you, that smile you give to your mate, the rushed report you churn out, the first uneasy feeling of volunteering your time, working alongside with someone you do not know, when you feel like giving up but came right back. President's Report

Clifton Beach SLSC has enjoyed a hugely successful season, following on from the great work of a number of people from recent years. The Club has been successful in a number of areas, has conducted programs of the highest quality, and continues to set itself up for the challenges and opportunities that await us in the years to come.

Clifton Beach SLSC ran a very successful Open Day to kick off the season. One of the major aims of the committee has been to engage further with the community and to look for ways to welcome others into our space. The Open Day was a way of achieving this, and it was terrific to see so many people from a variety of organisations come along and get involved. A highlight was to have a Welcome to Country performed by members of the Tasmanian Aboriginal Community, a first for our club. The Club has had a slight drop in members when measured against the previous season, but we continue to enjoy strong numbers in our Nipper program and with our patrolling members. There were 85 volunteers who patrolled on the beach this season, with a good mix of new and returning life savers.

There has been a concerted effort to offer awards training for IRB drivers and Assessors, and it is hoped we will see more of our members continue to attain awards in different areas over the coming season. Our members have made our club a welcoming place to be, with many people complimenting us on the way that we conduct ourselves and make others feel welcomed in our space. I would like to acknowledge all that our volunteers do, from protecting those on the beach, promoting safety and good sportsmanship, facilitating competitions, through to feeding the masses. On that note, I would like to thank Bettina Elischier and Anthea Bishop for their role as Canteen Coordinators over the past seasons. They have done a magnificent job in this role which has seen revenue increased in their time.

The Club was requested to host the Senior State Titles as a result of delays with the Carlton Park SLSC Clubrooms redevelopment. Thanks to a team of dedicated and hard-working volunteers, we ran what was regarded by some as the best State Titles in decades. The beach looked fantastic, the weather was perfect and there were over 200 athletes competing. Clifton Beach performed incredibly well, coming second on points score and winning the handicap trophy. It has hopefully demonstrated what can be achieved by other clubs when hosting major events.

In addition to the Senior State Titles, Clifton Beach was able to conduct a Statewide Carnival and a Regional Carnival at the club. Once again, a big thank you to all the volunteers who enabled this to happen. The Carnivals were a great success, and so pleasing to see Clifton win both the Senior and Junior Points Score at the Statewide Carnival.

I would like to thank all of our sponsors and supporters for their assistance once again this season. We receive great support from Federal and State Governments, Clarence City Council, Surf Life Saving Tasmania and all their sponsors, and to our own sponsors including Westbar, Harbour Financial Planning, Ride Bellerive, Safety Circle, Rogerson & Birch Surveyors, Pooley Wines, Nest Property, Direen Homes, Peppermint Bay Cruises and Next Level Kayaking. This has enabled us to continue to provide great service to our members and the wider community.

The Club now has solar panels on the roof and generating power, thanks to a grant from the Federal Government. This will reduce our power costs over the coming years and allow greater flexibility in how we use our finances. Thanks to Simon Bailey for overseeing this project and for BV Electrical for installing the panels.

The committee has worked tirelessly over the course of the season to make sure the club is moving forward and offering our members the best opportunities. There is much work to do in this area as the requirements around governance continue to evolve, but please be assured that the committee is working towards achieving the best outcomes for the club. Thanks to Matt Clingeleffer for his work this year as he steps down. Matt will continue to provide advice and direction from other roles within the club. I would also like to acknowledge Eleanor Kuylaars for her selfless dedication to the role of Junior Coordinator and for developing this area as one of the real strengths of our club. As we move forward into the next season, the club maintains a strong position, yet with plenty of work still to do. We need to continue to develop a strong membership list, encourage the attainment of awards, get our governance structures right for the betterment of future committees, and continue to build relationships within the broader community so that we have plenty of support in achieving our goals. Members helped with ARTC and defibrillator until paramedics arrived, and then transported the patient with the paramedics to a waiting ambulance. The training and mentoring of our members were on display to all and shone through for all to see, and is a great testament to the trainers who deliver our training at the club. Throughout the season we were able to meet our life saving commitments which ensured that visitors to the area were safe in the knowledge that, if they found trouble, we were there to help.

Thanks again to Simon Kay, Peter Williams, Alyce Hancock, Josh Foster Ciaran McDonald, Ned Reardon and Jenna Stacey for arranging and facilitating training to keep accreditations up to date and encouraging new patrolling members. As we move forward this season we will see a stronger approach to more structured training utilising our members who are completing their training qualifications. We are almost at the stage where we will have 7 members qualified to deliver the training which will help meet the needs members and ensure that the load is shared between trainers. Without you commitment we cannot provide the club programs. I do ask though that this coming season members commit to dates and times being offered and show up on time ready to complete the course. We are all volunteers, and we need to respect the time that our own trainers give to provide the best training there is. We will provide a training calendar well in advance so please don't turn up one week before patrols start or before a carnival wanting to do your proficiency.

The club hosted both a Junior and Open carnival, Regional carnival, the Hydrothon and the Senior State Titles. To host these events is a big undertaking, and I would lie if I did not question our ability to be able to cover every event. But through teamwork and support, we did. So, a huge thankyou to the patrolling members who provided water safety during these events. We would not be able to host these events without your commitment to providing water safety outside of your normal patrol duties so thank you for giving up your valuable time.

It is great to see our young guns stepping up and not only completing their patrols but also helping with water safety. Worthy mentions also are some of our new SRC members, Robbie Bird (38 hrs), Pippa Kuylaars (32.5 hrs), Laura Fullarton (29 hrs) and Isabella Copeland (30.5 hrs). These members are certainly pulling their weight around the club, and will no doubt be keen to complete their Bronze Medallions when they are able to do so. Once again thanks must go to all those who volunteered to assist with making sure the season was successful. People who man the BBQ for hours on end, Anthea Bishop and Bettina Elischer who took on the role as the canteen managers and have done a fantastic job throughout the season and leave the canteen knowing that they could not had done a better job.

Planning is under way for our next Bronze and SRC course which will include this seasons U14 members; it is planned that these individuals will be ready to start their patrols for the 2022/23 season We will support and nurture these members so that they become long term patrolling members.

Moving forward we have big things under way to further improve the facilities at the club house with construction of our new 12x8m Surf Boat Shed to start very soon. This will mean that we will be able to house all boats out of the weather including the storage of surf rescue equipment and gain more space in the main watercraft area of the clubhouse itself. The project has faced many hurdles but thanks to the support of the committee, Craig Rogerson and Rodney Kershaw, commencement is about to start on this project. You will see that we are reaching out to club supporters to help fund part of the project so please support these individuals and or businesses that support your club.

Our 14-kWh solar system has, over the last few months, been installed on the main roof area A big shout out to Brendan Volant from BV Electrical who brought the project in under budget. The system should save the club approximately \$6000 a year in power costs which means that once again we will have more money to spend on equipment and training but importantly helps us reduce our environmental footprint.

The third project that we have underway is the building of a new kitchen and upstairs toilets. This project will start very shortly, and we are hoping to have it finished before the start of the patrol season.

We have a brilliant location, and it would be great to see the clubhouse utilised in the off season more so if you have an idea about running an event for the club or community please come forward and speak with a committee member.

I encourage all members to become involved in whatever capacity they can to share the load and continue to grow our brilliant club. Whether it is being the brilliant stunning uniform officer, helping manage the canteen or running the bar there is something for you to do.

Summer is not that far away so I will see you on the beach soon.








This year was very sad that we lost one of our Life Members, Steve Gray (Fatman)

Life Member of the Club, Surf Life Saving Tasmania and the Australian Surf Boat Rowers League.He was instrumental part of every major event that has been held at Clifton Beach since 1967. He was the voice of Surf Boat Rowing at the Aussies and ASRL carnivals plus local carnivals over the last 40 years.

Steve passed away on 17th June this year after a long illness, followed by a three-day celebration of his life, in Fatman style. Sunday's paddle out reef laying and the spreading of Steve's ashes, was organised by Steve's wife Sarah and her family. It was a wonderful day and possibly a blue print for future celebration and farewells.

Vale Fatman



For a season that started strong but ended even stronger, we saw some outstanding results from our Senior Surf Sports team. We set a goal to win the Tasmanian Surf Lifesaving State Titles point score, falling short and into second by only 154 points to Burnie. This year has been the first time we have embarked on some extra curricular activities (outside of training and racing) and placed a strong emphasis on team bonding. This included the Shipsterns Bluff walk, school holiday Bicheno training and activities weekend, Ulverstone Regional Carnival camping trip and many Shoreline dinner nights after training.

Surf Safari:

We had 3 members complete the 21km course with Dan and Ollie undertaking the event for the first time at this distance.

In the 12km course, it was the first time that Cate, Mary, Courtney and Kate Reardon all completed the 12km course.

Carnival season:

This year we saw a team of committed athletes embarking on a long winter and strong summer worth of training. Most of our athletes were undertaking a series of swim, gym, board and ski sessions weekly. Our senior squad, under my coaching, had access to 4 x ski sessions per week, 2 x board sessions, 1 x gym session (offered to all, however only taken up by some with a cost at my workplace), 1 x iron person session and most athletes were undertaking approximately 3 x weekly swim sessions.

The results obtained by our athletes at state titles, is a culmination of their hard work at training, discipline, commitment to the sport and their teammates, and a well-structured and supported periodised training program.

Results include:

Winner of the Male (Warwick Lovell) and Female (Courtney) Open Single Ski. The most recent Clifton member to win these events were Matt Bevilacqua in 2010 and Andrea Smith in 2017. On that note, Warwick has returned to competition and as an assistant coach this year after many years away from racing.

Mary Clingeleffer won the Open Women's Iron Person at State Titles. The last Clifton member to win this event was Jane Kelly back in 1998. Mary is still an under 19 competitor and will be entering her first year of Open competition this upcoming season.

In the Open Women's Surf Race, Clifton competitors made up 4 of the top 5 place getters. Our women's Surf and Teams competitors won both the Open and Under 19 Women's Surf and Teams event, and placed 2nd in the U15 age group. Our men also took out the Open Male Surf and Teams event.

In the Board Rescue events across the female races, Clifton competitors won the U15, U19 and Open Women's age categories. Similarly in the male events, Clifton teams won both the U17 and Open male events.

In the Double Ski events, Clifton competitors had 4 x teams in the Open Women's Double Ski, placing 1st, 2nd, 4th and 6th. Similarly in the Mixed Double Ski, we made up majority of the field with Clifton teams finishing 1st, 4th, 5th and 6th.

Clifton competitors won 4 out of 8 events across both genders and all age groups in the Rescue Tube Rescue event

In addition to all this success on the water, a concept I introduced this season is to try and boost participation during the beach events, making it compulsory for all competitors to undertake 1 x beach event per carnival. Due to this we were able to achieve valuable points for the club, and to front some beach relay teams which were able to finish with two teams in the top 5 in the Open Women's Beach Relay and U15 Beach Relay, and two teams entered in the Open Men's Beach Relay, finishing both 4th and 5th.

Aussies:

We had a strong and eager group of athletes attend the Australian Surf Lifesaving Titles this year with 19 athletes competing across all age categories. Highlights from this event included Shayne Clarke winning a bronze medal in his age group for the single ski and James making a quarter final in the swim race.

Senior surf sports plans and goals for 2022/23 season:

- Retain athlete interest and enjoyment over an increased winter training season
- Continue to progress and develop our beginner U17 ski paddlers
- Undertake more sessions of coaching and mentoring for the nippers (only managed to do 1 last season)
- Continue to undertake team bonding/ building activities
 (already have undertaken first shoreline dinner and many team
 brekkies after winter ski training) and Bicheno school holiday
 training camp is booked in.
- Ensure a smooth transition for new U15 age group members and ensure there is a smooth and supported transition process in place for U14 club members
- Ensure all competition members are actively competing rostered patrols and ensuring this remains the priority for our members
- Set achievable goals with all athletes to assist with individual improvement for the new season
- I would like to extend my coaching resume and undertake some accredited coaching courses.
- Win the overall point score at state titles 2022/23

On behalf of myself, my assistant coaching team (Warwick Lovell and Graeme Van Galen) and the Senior Surf Sports Committee (Matt Clingeleffer, Barney Reardon and Richard Boult), we would like to thank CBSLSC for supporting and trusting in me as a coach to support our senior team, continual support and encouragement towards our athletes and for fostering such great athletes during their Nipper years. In addition to this, we would like to thank SLST for the running and officiating of carnivals which have allowed us to put all our hard training into practise.





2021/2022 Abbey Fairbrother Season Report

The 2021/2022 season was a milestone for me being the first season in my patrolling life (that is 11 seasons of patrols) that I have not patrolled at my home beach at Boat Harbour Beach SLSC. I have been a member of Boat Harbour Beach SLSC since 2004, as a little 6 year old, starting in Periwinkles. I grew up in Surf Life Saving which has provided me endless opportunities. To name a few highlights:

- Gained my Bronze Medallion in 2013, attended the inaugural Lifesaving Development Camp, at Devonport SLSC in 2014.
- Gained all my Silver Medallions (Patrol Captain, IRBD, Aquatic Rescue, Advanced First Aid) over a few years and became a Surf Sports Official and a Training Officer and soon to hold my full Certificate IV in Training and Assessing.

Across those years I have also held various leadership positions within the Lifesaving Development Camp and was Lifesaving Manager for four seasons at BHBSLSC. In 2019 I also had the opportunity to go to Fiji to be a Water Safety and Lifeguard Coordinator for Season 5 of Survivor - that was an amazing opportunity with SLST! That year I also started rowing with Burnie SLSC, which was also an achievement returning to competition and moving my competition rights from BHB to Burnie.

The 2020/21 was a tough one to navigate through the first season to be impacted by the covid-19 pandemic. Because of this hosting celebrations for 40 Years of Women is Surf Life Saving was going to be difficult. That was when Sisters in the Surf came about - an all female patrol to celebrate how far women have come in SLS. Sisters in the Surf was greatly supported to become a Statewide initiative with 70% of Tasmanian SLSC also having a Sisters in the Surf Patrol all on one day. This initiative went on to win SLST's 2021 Innovation of the Year which also went on to win the National SLSA Innovation of the Year Award.

Through the national recognition of the Sisters in the Surf Initiative, I was asked by Surf Life Saving Australia to be interviewed for International Women's Day (8th March), which was a fantastic way to put a spotlight on our little state.

This season's Sisters in the Surf Patrol at Clifton Beach was my favourite patrol of the season, getting to meet so many young women from the club was a great way to start the season. A shout out to the 10 girls that patrolled that day; it was the most efficient patrol pack up, including floor boarding the IRB, and took a lot of teamwork.

During the off season of between the 2020/21 and 2021/22 seasons I made to move to Hobart. Not long after I moved, Clifton Beach SLSC advertised a surf boat Come and Try morning, where I jumped at the opportunity to get in a boat in the south. After some time we formed a women's crew (The Young Guns including: Bettina Elischer, Jenna Stacey and Gemma Wright) to row in the Surf safari and we took out the short course against the Clifton Mens crew. We also rowed at the Burnie state-wide carnival and State Titles at Clifton Beach (with a fill-in crew thanks to covid - Thanks Meisha Austin and Jayde Richardson).

This season I was also accepted into Surf Life Saving Australia's 3rd cohort of the Women's Mentoring Program, which has been an amazing opportunity to grow and develop within surf life saving as well as expanding my network of inspiring surf life saving ladies. The Aussie's catch up of the Women's Mentoring Program was great to meet the women across all three cohorts. I also made a trip to Sydney to meet my mentor, Olivia Gardiner from Coogee, NSW.









Also this season I completed Mental Health First Aid Training, thanks to the sponsorship from the Harcourts Foundation and Surf Life Saving Tasmania. I was accepted onto the SLST Development Advisory Committee and very recently was appointed to be a part of the Workgroup to bring IRB racing back to Tassie too.
